


Editor's

What began as a small effort by the non-profit to assist a few women who were ragpickers and provide them with alternative employment has grown into a massive waste



management success story that links over one lakh families in the community, interacts with thousands of children, employs numerous women, and stops about 300 tons of waste from being dumped every day.

With the assistance of the TMC, SBV was able to acquire waste from the company and hired ragpicker women to properly segregate it at a waste management facility located in Kopri, Thane East.

This made it possible for the SBV team to plan the pickup of dry waste from various sites. 

aged 32 born a Hindu adivasi but presently follows Christianity. She was born at the Mulund dumping ground. She is fluent in Marathi and Hindi. Father was a rag picker at Mulund dumping ground. He used to drink a lot and come home and hit her mother. The parents had a big fight and the father left them in 2011

They are 5 siblings 2 brothers, 3 sisters. She is the youngest amongst the sisters followed by the two brothers.



The siblings would get only one meal a day of rice, subzi. If hungry bua; mayshi would give them something to eat. They stayed close by. Her childhood was one of hardships. She and another sister started going to the dumping ground, to collect waste for selling to feed the family when she was around 10yrs old.

She fell in love with her husband at the Mulund dumping ground went to her in-laws place at Govandi to stay with her in-laws. Her husband is from UP. She could not get along with her motherin-law and came back with her husband to stay next to her mother. They have 3 children 2 sons. I daughter all the 3 children go to Signal Shala. School bus comes and picks them up and drops them home. She is thankful to her present job for providing for her children's education. Signal Shala is also run by the same Samarth Bharat Vyaspeeth.

Her husband used to have Ganja before marriage but after the birth of their first son, he left the habit. He had terrible withdrawal symptoms and was admitted at Kalwa-Chatrapati Shivaji hospital for around a week. He recovered and has never gone back to the habit. Her caring nice Mother-inlaw paid the hospital bill of Rs. 5000/-.

He goes to Kanjurmarg dumping ground collects waste and sells on daily basis. Both of them together run the household. His daily earnings get spent in household expenses. She earns around 7000-8000/month. She saves in 2 B.C's with Maam at the work place of 1000/- rs each. She had borrowed Rs 20,000- from a money lender for the treatment of her son Siddharth around 5 yrs back. He suffered stomach infection she repays rs 1500/- towards the loan every month. At that moment she had just joined work and didn't know others well, whom to ask for loan. Presently she thoroughly, enjoys her job. All are so friendly including the administrators. She loves her job and gets so engrossed that she is unaware it's time to go home. She feels blessed being in her present job where she feels they are respected and treated well. She thoroughly enjoyed the picnic to the resort it was once in a lifetime opportunity. She had never been to one before.

She is a proud woman taking care of the house, the children, family. Her opinion of the male species is they can only do outside work. They can't do what a woman can do. But need a good companion if they can be one in old age.

She celebrates Christmas in a a big way. Makes puri sheera, sevaiyan gets new clothes for children. Children's program is there. She goes for mass and feast. Her faith in her Jesus developed after her husband left his addiction. She had asked pastor to pray for him. She celebrates, children's birthday with new clothes, cutting a cake and distributing to neighbouring Kids. She never goes to temple; parents would go to jivdani temple, Sai baba temple. She has only Jesus photo in her house. No pundits or Hindu priest ever come and approach them.

She wishes her children should study and work in a decent job not do the job of the parents rag picking. Her ever smiling face is there to stay. She feels everyday is happy moment.


